Feminist rhetoric refers to the persuasive strategies and discursive practices that highlight women's experiences and contribute to gender equality by challenging traditional narratives. Originating in the suffrage movements of the late 19th and early 20th centuries, it now encompasses various methods of communication, including speeches, written texts, and digital media. Central to feminist rhetoric is the emphasis on inclusivity, intersectionality, and empowering marginalized voices to effect societal change.
